Eta Carinae Nebula By Lou Tancredi

The *Eta Carinae Nebula* (NGC 3372) is a giant nebula about 9000 light years from us in the Sagittarius Arm of the Milky Way Galaxy. The nebula is one of the largest diffuse nebulae in our skies. Although it is some four times as large as and even brighter than the famous Orion Nebula, the Eta Carinae Nebula is much less well known due to its location in the southern sky. I was able to capture this image from Key West, Florida, in February 2019.
